For many homebound seniors this center is a lifeline to the outside world, many depend on the center to meet their basic needs such as receiving home delivered meals, receiving personal care, and transportation. For those able to come into the center it offers a sense of community and belonging, a place to congregate and share a meal with peers, a place for learning and wellbeing. The center provides meals 224 days out of the year and would like to expand services but funding limitations prevent this.

2022-2023 LIHEAP Fall Subsidy Program

KCEOC CAP Inc. is now accepting applications for the new **Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) Fall Subsidy Component**. Applications will be accepted from Nov 7th through Dec 16, 2022 or until designated funds are depleted on a first-come, first-serve basis.

The program is designed to help offset the cost of a household's heating expense. Income eligibility for the program is up to and including 130% of the Federal Poverty Guidelines. Benefits are paid directly to the heating vendor.

The Fall Subsidy Component provides households one-time benefit ranging from \$34 to \$206 depending on income levels, housing category, and heating fuel type.

All applicants will be required to supply the following documentation at the time of application:

Basic Eligibility Requirements:

All applicants will be required to supply the following documentation at the time of application:

- Proof of Social Security Number or Permanent Residence card (Green Card) for each member of the household.
- Proof of all household's (all members) income from the preceding month.
- Most current utility service bill including account number and name on account statement from your landlord if utility service expenses are included in your rent statement from utility company if you participate in a Pre-Pay Program.

7 Things You Can Do For Local Youths Experiencing Homelessness

1. Donate needed clothing (like jeans)

One of the most commonly requested items in homeless shelters is a pair of jeans. Why? Jeans are comfortable in any season and can be worn multiple times between washes. Plus, for a teenager without many belongings, wearing a pair of jeans can provide a sense of normalcy.

2. Help provide meals in your community

People navigating homelessness often struggle to find enough to eat, and this is especially true when it comes to young people, who often have a harder time accessing proper nutrition. One study found that one-third of un-housed and runaway teens experience food insecurity each month.

3. Support Your Local Youth Homeless Centers

Homeless and transitional shelters are so vital to getting young people the help that they need. Not only can they provide a safe place to sleep, they often also work to connect youths with other outside resources.

4. Challenge your assumptions & educate others

There are a lot of misconceptions out there about youth homelessness, and its lack of visibility accounts for a lot of the misunderstanding. We need to get introspective about our biases, learn the actual facts, and then help educate others.

5. Share crucial resources

For a lot of people, homelessness is a totally unexpected experience triggered by a sudden, destabilizing event (like job loss or a family tragedy), so people may not know exactly where to seek help. It's hard enough navigating different programs and services in general, much less as a teenager, but you can make it easier for young people in your community to find the help they need, by referring them to: **Ryan's Place Youth Crisis Center 606-595-3785.**

6. Advocate for policies that address youth homelessness

One of the most impactful things you can do for youth experiencing homelessness is creating systemic change. Support policies that provide assistance and opportunity for currently un-housed individuals. Then go a step further and become an advocate for things like affordable housing, access to health care, livable wages, and criminal justice reform.

Plus, make sure you're register to vote so that you can elect representatives who are committed to addressing homelessness in your community.

7. Just listen

Whether it's a classmate who's currently un-housed, a person you just met at a shelter, or someone sharing their story of homelessness online, it's important that you listen to the people who are directly impacted by these issues. They know firsthand the problems they've faced and the help that they need, so let them communicate that to you. And sometimes just listening is enough. In fact, the National Center for Health Research reports that youth experiencing homelessness often find it beneficial when people are "there for them" just by listening to them without trying to solve all of their problems.



About Ryan's Place:

Ryan's Place is dedicated to providing crisis housing and supportive services to youth between the ages of 18 and 24 in an encouraging environment; this allows program participants opportunities to grow and learn the skills they need to mature and become self-reliant. Ryan's Place is the only homeless transitional housing program dedicated to unprotected youth, serving a five county area in Southeastern Kentucky. It was made apparent that a youth homeless crisis center was needed in the area after KCEOC identified 35 homeless individuals in targeted service area during an annual nationwide homeless count. In addition, there were 219 youth served within a KCEOC program that served the general homeless population, yet did not focus on the specific, unique needs of homeless youth. Ryan's Place follows KCEOC's core principles of offering clients a hand up not a hand out. The goal of Ryan's Place is for all the residents to be able to become self-sufficient. Beginning with day one of admission; participants establish goals to obtain permanent housing. Ryan's Place offers an on-site case manager, employment services, life skills, and basic "adulting" lesson to youths that are transitioning into adulthood. Youth Voice meetings are encouraged at Ryan's Place, providing clients an opportunity to give feedback and input on program operations and services. These meetings have also been critical with the development of local leadership initiatives developed by the youth to help dispel stereotypes of the homeless youth population.

Ryan's Place is named in memory of Ryan White, a young man who found himself homeless several times in his short lifetime, he later became an advocate for other homeless youth. Ryan served on the Youth Action board throughout the grant proposal process, he designed the logo and he helped implemented Kentucky Housing Corporation's Coordinated Community Plan to Prevent and End Youth Homelessness.

Sadly Ryan passed away in a car accident just days after his 18th birthday, and just months before the youth shelter was opened. Ryan's Place is named in honor of both Ryan's memory and his passion for all homeless youth.

NATIONAL NATIVE AMERICAN

heritage month



Native American Heritage Month, also known as American Indian or Indigenous American month, is an opportunity to recognize and celebrate Native Americans' rich and diverse cultures, traditions, and stories. Community Action Agencies provide services addressing employment, education, housing, nutrition, emergency assistance, substance use, energy, and healthcare services to low-income Native American elders, adults, families, adolescents, and young children.

This month we celebrate Native American Heritage Month by recommitting ourselves to tribal sovereignty and lifting up Indigenous history, culture, and achievement.



KCEOC Community Action Partnership now has funding available for Homeless Prevention Services. Households must live in Bell, Harlan, Knox, or Whitley Co. Households must also be below 50% of area median income, & must not have sufficient resources or support networks immediately available to prevent them from moving to an emergency shelter or other location.

Applicants must meet one of the following “At-Risk” Factors:

- Has moved because of economic reasons two or more times during the 60 days immediately preceding the application for homelessness prevention assistance;
- Is living in the home of another because of economic hardship;
- Has been notified in writing that their right to occupy their current housing or living situation will be terminated within 21 days after the date of application for assistance;
- Lives in a hotel or motel and the cost of the hotel or motel stay is not paid by charitable organizations or by federal, State, or local government programs for low-income individuals;
- Lives in a single-room occupancy or efficiency apartment unit in which there reside more than two persons or lives in a larger housing unit in which there reside more than 1.5 people per room, as defined by the U.S. Census Bureau;
- Is exiting a publicly funded institution, or system of care (such as health-care facility, mental health care facility, foster care or other youth facility, or correction program or institution); or
- Otherwise lives in housing that has characteristics associated with instability and an increased risk of homelessness, as identified in the recipient’s approved consolidated plan

RRH HELPS

Rapid Re-Housing (RRH) is a set of strategies developed in coordination with an individual or family, to help them quickly move out of homelessness and into permanent housing. It is offered without preconditions (e.g., employment, income, absence of criminal record, or sobriety) and the resources and services provided are typically tailored to the unique needs of the household.

KCEOC Community Action Partnership will accept individuals and families into the ESG Rapid Re-Housing program who fall under HUD guidelines for homelessness and meet ESG criteria for services; participation in the RRH program is voluntary.

RRH does not have service participation requirements or preconditions to entry, the program is extremely low-barrier for those wishing to participate.

The **only** requirements for the program are:

- Participants must fall under HUD's Category 1 (street/shelter homeless) definition
- **(OR)** Participants must fall under HUD's Category 4 (domestic violence) definition for homelessness to be eligible for assistance.

Homeowner Assistance Fund

OVERVIEW

The Team Kentucky Homeowner Assistance Fund keeps Kentucky homeowners safe and healthy in their homes and protects them from foreclosure due to delinquent mortgage, tax, insurance and utility payments and homeowner's association fees due to financial distress caused by COVID-19.

PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

Kentucky received \$85.4 million in federal American Rescue Plan Act Funds to help prevent foreclosure for homeowners who have been impacted economically by COVID-19. After working with the U.S. Treasury for six months, Kentucky Housing Corporation (KHC) the agency administering these federal funds, received approval for its program plan in late December.

Qualifying homeowners may receive up to \$35,000 in assistance to repay delinquent mortgage bills, utility payments, insurance premiums, property taxes and homeowner's association fees. Payments will be made directly to the agencies owed.

DETAILS

- The Homeowner Assistance Fund portal will open at 8 a.m. Monday, February 7, 2022.
- Funds will be available until fully expended or September 30, 2025, whichever comes first.
- Homeowners must meet certain income guidelines. An income calculator is available at <https://teamkyhaf.ky.gov>.
- Applicants must be living in the home, and were living in it during the pandemic hardship, for which they are applying for assistance.
- To qualify, homeowners must work with a participating HAF housing counselor, who will walk them through the process.
- Homeowners must provide verification of income and an assessment of their home and property.
- All documents will be electronically signed.
- The date of the qualifying hardship has to have occurred on or after January 21, 2020.
- Lump sum, direct payments will be made to the services, utility companies, insurance companies, county tax administrators and homeowner's associations.

SLIDE BULLETS

- Starting February 7, 2022, Kentucky will launch the Homeowner Assistance Fund, a statewide effort to prevent foreclosures.
- Not all homeowners will qualify. They must meet income requirements as well as produce certain documents showing their financial distress from COVID.
- Assistance is available for delinquent mortgage payments, utility bills, insurance premiums, property taxes and homeowner's association fees.
- Utilities include electric, water, sewer and gas. Qualifying homeowners must be at least 90 days past due to receive utility assistance.
- Approved homeowners may receive up to \$35,000 in assistance. Homeowners may only receive assistance one time.
- Payments will be made directly to the entities owed – mortgage servicers, utility companies, etc.
- Each applicant will work with a housing counselor, who will guide them through the process.

The Team Kentucky Homeowner
Assistance Fund will pay:

- Mortgage payments (up to 6 months of past due payments)
- Mortgage-related expenses
- Liens
- Homeowner's association fees, condominium association fees
- Property taxes
- Insurance
- Utilities (must be at least 90 days past due)

To qualify, homeowners must:

- Sign a document explaining their COVID hardship
 - Loss of income*
 - Increase in expenses*
- Have an income less than 150% of the area median income

Payments will be made:

- Up to \$35,000 per household
- Directly to those owed
 - Servicers
 - HOAs
 - Insurance companies
 - Tax assessors
 - Utility providers (electric, gas, water, sewer)

*The threshold for qualification is a hardship of 15% or greater - 15% or greater reduction in income or 15% or greater increase in household expenses. Applying for assistance and signing the affidavit of hardship is not a guarantee of approval for HOAF funds.
