

Senior Citizens Center

Open letter to Knox County Residents and those concerned about services provided for Senior Citizens:

For many years Knox County Help operated the Senior Citizen Center in Barbourville, KY. The center provides homecare and personal care services, congregate and delivered meals to senior citizens in Knox County. Over time funding for these programs has been continually reduced to the point that it created serious financial issues for Knox County Help. Towards the end of 2018, the Knox County Help Board of Directors agreed they could no longer afford to operate the program. Upon hearing this Mayor Thompson reached out to KCEOC Community Action Partnership to determine a course of action to ensure senior citizens still had access to these critical programs. KCEOC, Cumberland Valley Area Development District, and Knox County Help met to determine the current status and potential future of the program. The KCEOC Community Action Partnership Board of Directors agreed the services provided for the senior citizens in the community are a critical need and must remain. The decision was made that KCEOC Community Action Partnership would begin oversight of the Knox County Senior Center and provide services beginning January 1, 2019. The determination included the stipulation that to maintain the present services a significant amount of additional funding would be required to cover the operating expenses in addition to the funding provided by the contracts. The KCEOC Board of Directors also felt strongly that if funding can be secured the services need to be expanded to include more clients.

KCEOC Community Action Partnership, agreed to oversee the senior citizen programming provided enough funds could be solicited to cover the expense deficit. Once the deficit is covered, the plan of expansion and addition of services will be enacted. The financial shortfall was expected, and after providing services for seven months it was determined that the expenses are around \$95,000 yet the contract income is only about \$65,000, meaning the deficit is over \$30,000 for each year of operation.

The Knox County Fiscal Court and the Barbourville City Council have each graciously donated \$2,000, leaving the estimated shortfall around \$26,000 for 2019's operational costs.

Everyone's help is needed to secure funding to cover basic expenses and allow the Senior Center to remain open. The KCEOC Community Action Partnership Board of Directors will be making a decision between October and December 2020 as to the viability of being able to continue services.

Programs/Services:

Congregate Meals: A program for Seniors 60 and older in which they visit the center at 130 Harding Street in Barbourville to receive socialization, networking, nutrition education, information/referral services and a hot meal during lunch. Lunch is served from 11:30 am till Noon. Seniors are encouraged to come to the center at 9:00 am and stay until 2pm each day to enjoy the center and the services provided.

Congregate Meal Transportation: Transportation is provided to and from the center for the congregate meal program for attendee's. Seniors who want to be transported should call the center from 8:00 am - 8:30 am at 606-546-5191. Transportation to and from the center is free.

Homecare Services: The program is for eligible seniors who are 60 and over and have been screened through the Aging Disability Resource Center and deemed eligible to receive in-home services. Services include dusting, sweeping, mopping, laundry services, grocery shopping, vacuuming and heavy cleaning as needed. To apply, contact the Aging and Disability Resource Center at 606-877-5763.

Home Delivered Meals: The program is for eligible seniors who are 60 and over and have been screened through the Aging Disability Resource Center and deemed eligible to receive home delivered meals. This program provides home delivered meals and nutrition education to seniors. To apply, contact the Aging and Disability Resource Center at 606-877-5763.

Personal Care Services: The program is for eligible seniors who are 60 and over and have been screened through the Aging Disability Resource Center and deemed eligible to receive in-home services. Personal care services include assisting with non medical services such as bed making, bathing, exercising and shampooing, shaving, dressing, toileting and walking. Did you know?



The Weatherization Assistance Program is the Nation's oldest and largest whole home performance program. The program has provided services to low income families for over 40 years. Through the process of Weatherization, energy bills are reduced by 30 to 50%. This gives families in our community more disposable income to cover necessities like food and medication, allowing for increased quality of life.

In addition to reducing the burden of costly energy bills, the Weatherization Assistance Program addresses many Health and Safety issues in the home. Through this effort the life of the home is extended and becomes a safer living environment. Most weatherized homes receive an Ashrae compliant whole home exhaust fan that improves the indoor air quality. Many clients vulnerable to pneumonia and other breathing diseases have stated an improvement in the home air quality after the receiving weatherization.

KCEOC's Youth Crisis Center Ryan's Place is a safe haven for youths aged 18-24 experiencing homelessness. The center has four two bedroom units and shared common areas. There is onsite case management that provides educational skills, life skills, employment services, and other supportive services. Clients are assisted with obtaining permanent housing while getting back on their feet. Ryan's Place helps clients learn basic skills needed to become independent and live on their own.

Haley's Story:

A former participant of Ryan's Place, Haley Smith, found herself homeless at the age of 18. Differences in opinions between her family had forced her to move out. Haley left home with a small bag of belongings and the new stress of finding a place to call home. She then heard about Ryan's Place and took the leap of faith and hoped for a new beginning. Ryan's Place was Haley's home for four months. When asked about her experience at Ryan's Place Haley said, "My experience was competitive and stressful at times, I was competing with life itself and with my own self worth I had the weight of the world on my shoulders, but the staff was amazing and overall it was a good experience."

"Ryan's Place is also a place where you discover yourself. At such a young age I had to fend for myself before I learned basic "adulting" skills. Ryan's Place helped me with the transition into adulthood. What I liked most about Ryan's Place was gaining my independence and learning those life skills like if you don't do your laundry you don't have clothes to wear and if you don't cook, you don't have a meal to eat. Ryan's Place taught me to just be my own individual, and that it is okay to mess up. What is important is you learn from your mistakes and move on from them. I learned how to work with others and how to be a responsible adult."



Ryan's Place makes a difference in each client's life both short term and long term. For Haley, "The most important changes I have made are making sure I always used my time wisely, I think that's the key to success *especially* when you're trying to get back on your feet. I worked very hard next door at KCEOC's KY Career Center Job sight. On my last day I was anxious because all this time I had been searching for a job without luck, then they hand me a piece of paper with a phone number and said "try this." It was a job working on a farm, I called the number and received the job after an interview! I have to say the biggest change however came from within, I learned how to use coping skills and other resources when I feel down, I could talk to the case manager or go for a little walk around town, I was always doing something productive. I learned to never allow a moment in time to define your entire future. Having a job and being independent is something I've always dreamed of, I always hated relying on other people, but as I got older I realized it is okay to ask for help and get the support you need."

Haley was able to become independent following her stay at Ryan's Place. When asked what advice she would give youths in similar situations she responded, "Don't ever be afraid to ask for help, get out there every day and use your time wisely, find a hobby you enjoy and keep yourself busy. Also, always stay motivated and faithful, you can accomplish anything you want if you work for it! It's ok if you need help finding motivation— just have faith there is always hope. Don't ever give up! I want other youths to know if you feel like there is no hope, call KCEOC they care and I care and there is hope with us."

The ultimate goal for all clients at Ryan's Place is to gain self-sufficiency, Haley has since moved into her own home. "From being homeless to being able to support yourself is a great accomplishment. The feeling of being in your new home is overwhelming but very exciting; at first it can be scary to be on your own when you really sit down and think about it you wonder- How did I get here, is this really real? I went from being homeless and not knowing how to deal with myself, my problems or anything else to having a home and job where I'm earning my own money and taking care of myself, my life is so different!"

Haley was recently married and is expecting twins. Her husband is working two jobs to ensure their future financial stability. Their family is looking forward to a bright future. KCEOC and Ryan's Place are very proud of Haley and how much she has accomplished!

Program Specifics







Rental Counseling

Rental property makes up a significant piece of the local housing stock and provides homes for individuals and families who are not able to afford to be a homeowner, or whose conditions simply make renting a better alternative. Having the knowledge to better understand the scope of renting will create an improved overall experience for the renter and landlord. Rental counseling is a relatively short program, but has lasting effects. Target demographic is both individuals /families seeking housing, or those in jeopardy of being evicted from their current residence. Individual or group workshops are available. This is a free service offered by KCEOC.

DID YOU KNOW

- HUD approved housing counselors provided 8% of overall housing counseling services in rental counseling with over 90,000 clients served in FY 2015.
- More than 1 million clients each year receive federal assistance towards affordable rentals; the clients served include low-income families, the elderly, and persons with disabilities.
- Clients counseled received assistance with their utility bills and other rental support.
- Clients were able to determine if they met the requirements for Housing Choice Voucher Program (Section 8) and public housing.
- Rental evictions rates have increased since 2014 and the current rental vacancy rate is 7.3%.

Success in Child Welfare

Key Takeaways

1. Head Start children have lower rates of abuse and neglect and are less likely to be involved in the child welfare system.
2. Head Start provides parenting training opportunities, improves parent involvement and parent-child relationships, and decreases parental distress.

Measurable Impact

Child welfare

Early Head Start children have significantly fewer child welfare encounters when they reach the ages of 5-9 years old and lower rates of reported physical or sexual abuse.

93%

Head Start children are 93% less likely to be removed from their homes and placed in foster care than those with no early education services.

Non-parental care

Head Start enhances school readiness for children living in non-parental care and improves social-emotional outcomes for those in foster care.

Supportive services

Head Start increases families' receipt of supportive services and home visiting, decreases spanking, and improves parent involvement for children living in non-parental care.

The Head Start Advantage: Success in Child Welfare

Why is child welfare an important focus in Head Start?

Children who live in poverty are twice as likely as their affluent peers to have been exposed to three or more distressing and traumatic life events. These events, called Adverse Childhood Experiences or ACEs, can impact a person for a lifetime. U.S. children with two or more ACEs are significantly more likely to have developmental, behavioral, or social delays and to exhibit behavioral problems or aggression. They also have lower rates of school engagement and higher rates of chronic disease. Adults who had four or more ACEs as children are 4- to 12-times more likely to suffer from alcoholism, drug abuse, and depression.

It is estimated that, in the United States, more than 270,000 children under the age of 5 experience abuse or neglect each year and another 160,000 children under 5 are in foster care. Early childhood traumatic experiences, such as abuse and neglect, can cause short- and long-term cognitive and emotional delays. Young foster children face a variety of risks that negatively affect their development in everything from math and reading to social-emotional skills.

A 2017 study found that almost all children in Early Head Start had experienced at least one adverse experience, and more than 4% had experienced 4-5 ACEs before the age of 3.

What does Head Start do to support children involved or at risk of being involved in the child welfare system?

Head Start's multi-generational approach focuses on providing opportunities and addressing the needs of both children and their parents. Head Start provides families with a variety of services that help enhance family stability and reduce children's exposure to ACEs, such as access to mental health services, substance abuse treatment, domestic violence services, and affordable housing. As a core part of Head Start's family engagement model, parenting education impacts parents' use of physical discipline and level of engagement in educational activities with children, as well as promotes healthy parent-child relationships and home environments, which ultimately reduces children's involvement with child protective services.

Children in foster care and children experiencing homelessness are eligible to participate in Head Start, regardless of their family's income level. In 2017-2018, Head Start served more than 34,000 children in foster care and more than 20,000 children referred from child welfare agencies.



Head Start improves children's social and emotional outcomes, including improved approaches to learning and reduced hyperactivity, particularly for children who have been exposed to violence or neighborhood crime.



Mothers in Early Head Start provide more supportive parenting behaviors for their children, despite experiencing elevated depressive symptoms.



Families participating in Early Head Start have better parenting and family outcomes, including lower levels of parenting stress, more supportive home environments, and less family conflict, which in turn, lead to reductions in child maltreatment and a 10-22% lower likelihood of child welfare system involvement.

What is Head Start?

Head Start (HS) is a comprehensive early education program for children from at-risk backgrounds from birth to age 5. From early math and reading skills to confidence and resilience, Head Start helps children build the abilities they need to be successful in school and life. Head Start recognizes the role of parents as their child's first and lifelong educators and engages parents as equal partners.
